Objectives and activities

The purpose of the Charity is to care for its collection of books, originally established in 1680 by the Drummond family as the first free lending library in Scotland, and the purpose built building in which these are housed. The Governors are committed to maintaining and building on the core values of the founding family by offering educational opportunities for those who seek to improve their knowledge of Scottish Literature and History. We will preserve this tranquil, unspoilt rural environment for thinking people to read, contemplate, study and meet.

Structure, governance and management

The Innerpeffray Mortification is an Endowment Scheme approved under the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Acts 1928 to 1935 on 8 June 1937 and amended as The Innerpeffray Mortification Scheme 2020 on 22 October 2020.

Governors are appointed by the terms of the founding deed, as amended, whereby the owners of Gleneagles Estate are governors by right and remain in office indefinitely. Perth & Kinross Council appoints a councillor from a local ward to be a governor who remains in office as long as he / she remains an elected councillor. Should any governor wish to resign the remaining governors will identify a suitable replacement with consideration given to the skills and experience required. A new governor will receive copies of previous years' accounts and a copy of the founding document and receive training and guidance as necessary. The Governors meet regularly to discuss the Library's strategic planning, monitor finances and ensure the collection and buildings have suitable care and maintenance.

Summary of the year

The Year at Innerpeffray begins in January with housekeeping tasks such as dusting, checking and cataloguing of books, and preparing a new exhibition for visitors when the Library reopens in March.

In February the library became a film location when HeeHaw productions brought their cast and crew to film scenes from 'Christmas in Scotland', a new drama for American television.

Exhibitions for the year covered two main themes: A Library of Learning featured books on education, manuals and 'how to' books and Nothing New explored ideas of the past re-invented for the modern age. A Library of Learning began with some never-before displayed items from the collection — notebooks and other handwritten material belonging to the founding family — and went on to look at a wide variety of information books such as A Manual for Goldsmiths (1677), A Treatise on the Management of Bees (1770) and The Guide to Domestic Happiness (1804).

Nothing New displayed a wide variety of books, drawing parallels with modern day innovation. Examples included *recycling*, a technique frequently used in book-making for making paper; using waste or scrap paper to reinforce bindings, *self-help books and the promotion of wellbeing*, this kind of literature was very popular in the 17th century and books with titles like *The Art of Contentment* were available to borrow. Visitor Numbers were again increased from the previous year, with over 2700 visitors to the Library and over 500 taking part in events. Group tours in the year from travel trade companies Bolderman Tours, Wilderness Scotland and White Rose Guild and incentive specialists Spectra took place throughout the summer season and we also hosted group visits from Colinton Local History Society, National Trust for Scotland Edinburgh members group, University of Wisconsin and a visit for delegates as part of the Books and Borrowing conference.

Education, Research and Outreach Work

University of Stirling Library hosted an exhibition using material from Innerpeffray. We chose to showcase the advertising theme from the previous year. This regular exchange of exhibitions helps to raise awareness of Innerpeffray to users of the University Library and further the relationship between the two bodies. Also in partnership with the University of Stirling, Isla Macfarlane has been working on her AHRC funded Applied Research PhD researching the Visitors' Books at Innerpeffray. Isla is currently working part time. Transcription of the first Visitor Book and studies of some of the individual visitors continued throughout the year.

The Library also hosted a study trip on Historical Bibliography from The University, led by Dr Kelsey Jackson Williams.

Lara Haggerty, Keeper of Books took part in the Books and Borrowing Conference at the University of Stirling in April, giving a talk about the Library and sitting on the closing panel session. She gave an online briefing on starting in retail for the Historic Libraries Forum as well as being a member of their committee, part of the Rare Books In Scotland group and representative on the Independent Libraries Association Committee as well. Lara attended the Association of Scottish Visitor Attractions (ASVA) Annual Conference in Perth and the Historic Libraries Forum conference in Leeds, where she was a guest speaker. As the guest of the Hungarian Ambassador, Lara represented the Library and its connection to the Drummond family at the St Margaret Commemorative Dinner in Edinburgh. Lara was also in demand to give talks to groups and societies particularly in the winter months. This year she visited Stirling, Kippen, Comrie and Blarigowrie as well as taking bookings for early 2024 for five other groups.

Events

There was a full and varied programme of events throughout the year at Innerpeffray. We opened the season with **Songs and Books** with a performance from Perthshire duo PlaidSong, combining traditional and new music that had connections with books, including many in the Innerpeffray collection. This was followed by the Innerpeffray Lecture from Professor Andrew Pettegree from St Andrews University who spoke about libraries past present and future.

In March, a series of weekend talks, postponed from our Festival of Reading the previous September, due to the death of HM Queen Elizabeth II. Dr Caroline Copeland, Mark Bridgeman and Molly Arbuthnot all spoke about their work during the month of March.

A **Coronation Concert** organised by the Friends of Innerpeffray Library, and curated by Joan Taylor took place in May. This was held in Innerpeffray Chapel and attracted a wide audience and marked the coronation of King Charles III with music, song and readings from the collection in the Library.

The Library ran a series of hands-on session under the banner 'The Art of the Book' which included Making a Hard-Back Book with Marion Archibald and Printing from Nature, with Gillean Ford.

Dominic Pearce, author of *The King's Only Champion*, a new biography of the First Marquis of Montrose, spoke about his book and David Robertson spoke about *Lost Country Houses of Perthshire* to a packed audience in the summer.

We welcomed back *The Three Inch Fools* with their outdoor production of *As You Like It* in July bringing an audience of over 200 people to enjoy Shakespeare on a beautiful Perthshire evening. We thank the Friends of Innerpeffray Library for their support with this event. We also hosted a training evening on bat identification from The Bat Conservation Trust discovering that three kinds of species make their home at Innerpeffray: pipistrelle, long-eared and Daubenton bats.

The theme for the Festival of Reading in 2023 was Wild Words, and a variety of authors and speakers gathered at Innerpeffray to speak about their work. We kicked off the Festival with a satellite event in Crieff at Strathearn Arts, when Crieff Drama Group presented a rehearsed reading of *Heroic Strife Famed Afar*, the story of the Jacobite rebellion as seen through the lens of contemporary writers. Guests over the weekend were: Merryn Glover, Keith Broomfield and Fiona Valpy with Natalie Russell leading a children's workshop and Jennie Turnbull running a pop-up poetry event in the stone circle by the river.

A Winter Fayre was held in early November with a selection of local crafts and the Library's own shop moving to the Schoolroom to encourage sales of merchandise. Many thanks to Gwyneth Hardy for hosting a very popular Wreath Making Workshop to raise funds in the following week. *Nunkie Theatre* made a welcome return to the Schoolroom in November for tales of the uncanny by MR James.

The year concluded with the Friends of Innerpeffray Library. Carols in the Chapel and in the Library.

Volunteers and Staff

The Governors are grateful to the two staff members, Lara Haggerty (Keeper of Books) and Naomi Harvey (Assistant to the Keeper) who do so much to keep the Library alive. They are ably supported by a group of over 20 volunteers including supporting events, keeping the grounds tidy and guiding visitors around the collection. We welcomed three new volunteers to the team in 2023 including new members for the gardening team and Laurie Holdsworth from the US who spent three weeks with us, including helping with the Festival. A *Vision Meeting* was hosted by the Governors to invite the idea and suggestions from the team on the future strategy of the Library.

The Governors began a process to recruit Trustees in December and with the intention to make these appointments in early 2024. David Cashman and Patrick Steuart Fothringham resigned in 2023 and we thank them for their input to the work of the Mortification. Patrick oversaw the planting of new specimen trees on the Heritage Trail and we look forward to seeing these grow over future years. Arabella Connell retired as Chair and from the Governors in February of 2023. Her contribution to the Board of trustees over the past ten years has been substantial, and we are very grateful to her for the time and energy donated to the library particularly to the Heritage Trail and its opening, and for steering the Library through difficult times as Chair during the lockdown of 2020 and donations of trees for the new outside space.

As a special thanks for everyone who supports the Library, The Innerpeffray Register was launched in 2023. Following on from the Borrowers' Register and the Visitor Books, this new volume will record those who contribute to the Library today: Friends, volunteers, donors. The Register also encourage new donors to assist with the essential costs to ensure the Library continues into the future.

The Governors are grateful to all those individuals and organisations that have supported the Library with their time, gifts, grants and donations. This year we would particularly like to thank The Friends of Innerpeffray Library, Perth and Kinross Council, The Drummond Foundation, The TA Fund, the Cairncross Charitable Trust, and the HR Creswick Charitable Trust.

Investments

The trustees have the power to deposit or invest sums in any manner, providing the powers are exercised only in promoting the objectives of the Charity.

Risk management

The Governors have considered the major risks to which the Charity is exposed, have reviewed those risks and established systems and procedures to manage those risks.

Review of financial position

The financial performance of the Charity is considered satisfactory. The Library gratefully acknowledges the generous contribution of trust funds, other charities, individual contributions and those who support our events.

Governors' / Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) and the requirements of the Charities SORP (FRS102).

The financial statements are also prepared in accordance with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The financial statements have been prepared using pounds sterling, the functional currency of the Charity, rounded to the nearest £1.

The Charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102.

Fund structure

Unrestricted funds comprise accumulated surpluses or deficits on general funds and they are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objectives.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds that the Governors, at their discretion, have set aside for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are created when funds are received for a particular purpose, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose. The related expenditure is charged to the statement of financial activities when incurred.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the resources, it is probable that the resources will be received and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all the costs related to that category.

Costs are allocated between restricted and unrestricted funds on a basis designed to reflect the usage of the resource.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided on tangible assets at rates calculated to write off the carrying value, less residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Building improvements - 4% per annum straight line
Signage - 25% per annum straight line
Furniture - 20% per annum straight line
IT Equipment - 33% per annum straight line

Investments

Investments are managed by independent brokers and have been included at market value. Realised and unrealised gains on investments are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities when they arise.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

By reason of its charitable status the Charity is considered to be exempt from income and corporation taxes. The Charity is not registered for value added tax and accordingly cannot recover any of that tax on its expenditure, with irrecoverable tax included in the relevant expenditure incurred.

Restricted fund purposes:

Saint Germain Bequest - An endowment from Mrs Janet Saint Germain. The capital sum has been invested via the Charity's stockbrokers with the income being available for use by the Governors to help the Library.

Year of Stories Fund - Funds towards storytelling events.

Digital Catalogue Fund - Funds to create a digital catalogue of the books held in the library.

COVID-19 Grants – Funds to support revenue lost during lockdown, towards additional costs related to re-opening of the library, and recovery support.

Event support fund - Funds to support the cost of events at the library.

Septic tank fund – Funds to meet costs of remedial work required.

Roman Strathearn guidebook fund – Funds to assist in developing a guidebook about Roman occupation of the area.
