
### Opening Lines

We reopened the Library for visits on Saturday 1st March and had a day packed with visitors! The new exhibition, *Book Marking: the things we write in books* has been great fun to put together and I'd like to thank everyone in the volunteer team for helping to make it happen. The books on display include names that help us trace the provenance of the books, how they arrived in the collection, and messages, dedications and comments. Look out for a series of blog posts looking in-depth at the stories revealed about the books. Illustrated

below right is one of the more unusual scribbles on display:

The Lord's Prayer written inside a circle (probably drawn round a coin) in *The History of the World*, by Sir Walter Raleigh, 1634. This is the copy that belonged to James Graham, First Marquis of Montrose.

Last month we were delighted to be able to make some additions to the Innerpeffray collection when we acquired some new books. Thanks to an anonymous donor, we now have some of the books belonging to the Murrays of Dollerie. Dollerie House is close to Innerpeffray and the Murray



family were connected to the Library for many years. An event to welcome the Dollerie collection to the Library is planned for later in the year and we will be sharing more about the books in the coming months.

I'm delighted to say that the Friends have a full programme of talks and musical events planned for the year ahead, and you can read about all our events on the back page. ### Reading Forms: Textile Artist Exhibition and Tours

Coming up in May, we are delighted to have Textile Artist Helen Gallogly, known for her costume work on the Outlander drama series, present a site-specific visual art project:

'Reading Forms' inspired by her time spent at Innerpeffray over the past two years. The exhibition will display printed textile sculptures, positioned throughout the Library location, presenting new visual narratives investigating the site and the content of its rare and

antiquarian books.

Helen Gallogly, Artist says:

"With Libraries disappearing from our national landscape, and a digital world growing, I have felt an urgency to connect creatively with this site, where the free and open sharing of information began in Scotland. Here we can slow down and reconnect with others over tactile sources"



Gallogly's upbringing around an antiques shop developed her lifelong interest in objects, materials and places with a history. Her work with surface pattern evolved from her costume work, to explore soft sculpture and mixed media works. The project began with a VACMA research award (fife contemporary/Creative Scotland). Following a development period, Gallogly was awarded a grant from Creative Scotland in November 2024, to bring the work to a completed exhibition.

Jackie Stewart, Creative Industries Officer at Creative Scotland says: "Libraries are more than repositories of books; they are living spaces of shared knowledge, creativity, and community. 'Reading Forms' at Innerpeffray Library beautifully illustrates how history, art, and storytelling can converge to spark new perspectives on the relevance of libraries today. At a time when these vital spaces face uncertainty, this project reaffirms their role as evolving cultural hubs that connect and inspire."

'Reading Forms' runs from May 2nd - May 31st 2025 and is open to the public within the Library's opening hours. A series of talks and tours led by Helen will be available to book.



## Book Marking—Highlights from the Exhibition

We are often asked, "where did the Founder get his books?". The short answer is, from lots of different places, or simply, we don't really know. But we do actually know quite a bit about some of the original collection. On display in this year's exhibition are a selection of books that show some of the sources of the founding collection. We begin with his family.

Andrew Wood of Largo is a descendant of Sir Andrew Wood of Largo, Admiral of Scotland, a famous figure in the Scottish Navy. He is connected to Innerpeffray through James Drummond, 1st Lord Madertie, our Founder's grandfather. His daughter, Jean married Andrew Wood of Largo in 1606, though she died, without children, in 1618. Andrew Wood became a burgess of the City of Perth in 1632, so was certainly wealthy and died there in 1649.

Wood not only writes his name in his books, he often decorates favourite passages with his initials or a cipher (where the initials are intertwined to make a symbol). We don't know whether the Founder ever met Wood, his aunt's husband, though if Wood was in Perth it is perfectly possible. Perhaps the books were passed to him



when Wood died, regardless, twenty-seven of his books are now a core part of the Innerpeffray collection.



Patrick, Lord Drummond is great-uncle to the Founder and we have seven books in the collection that bear his signature. He has a legible distinctive hand, even in childhood, as we can see here in his Arithmetic textbook from 1585 (left).

Many of his books are in French, including the arithmetic book and a magnificent Cosmographie, 1575. We also have a book signed by Patrick's mother, Lilias Drummond.



For both of these family collections the link seems to be Madertie's grandfather, James Drummond, 1st Lord Madertie, friend to James VI. More about his books in the next newsletter.
