### Did Mary, Queen of Scots visit Innerpeffray?

The latest Innerpeffray blog is now available, looking at an intriguing possibility that Mary Queen of Scots may have visited Innerpeffray at a particularly key time within her turbulent reign. One reference states she stayed the night at Innerpeffray Castle on the 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1565, with James Drummond of Innerpeffray her host. Other references show a different itinerary, though the same date for a visit still occurs, however it was known that the 'royal clerks were not always immaculate in their dates'. One reference suggests it was to Innerpeffray Abbey. Should it have stated Castle rather than Abbey, or was it a reference to Innerpeffray Chapel or Inchaffray Abbey?

#### Henry, Lord Darnley

The visit to Innerpeffray falls between meeting Lord Darnley in February 1565 and then marrying him in July 1565. He was a Catholic and was descended from both James II of Scotland and Henry VII of England.

Queen of Scots, Date: About When Mary met him for the first time she thought him 'the lustiest and best proportioned lang (tall) man she had seen'. Mary subsequently married him at Holyrood and proclaimed him King of Scots without the consent of Parliament.

As a result of opposition to the marriage, Mary travelled across Perthshire numerous times between February and July 1565 to gather support. It was quite likely Darnley was with Mary on these journeys, with the intriguing possibility that he was with her at Innerpeffray, meeting Lord Drummond and key members of his family and clan on the 2<sup>nd</sup> June to confirm their continued backing. If she had visited, then it would be highly likely she, Darnley and her retinue would have passed the site of the future Innerpeffray Library, up the Roman cutting below the Library and maybe even entered the chapel.

#### Arsenic and Old Books?

#### **Book Covers in Emerald Green**

The Library took part recently in a pilot project run by a team at the University of St Andrews who are developing a simple testing process to help libraries identify toxic elements in book covers from the 19<sup>th</sup> century, specifically, Emerald Green or copper acetoarsenite. Their work has found that bookbindings containing Emerald Green have a distinctive pattern in the visible part of the spectrum that is distinguishable from other green pigments.

Innerpeffray has approximately 900 books from the 19th century but this colourant was used most commonly between 1830 – 1860, reducing the potential field to just over 200. During the visit the team tested 32 books with three variations of spectroscopy and flagged eight out of these for further testing. Three books were found to be consistent with Emerald Green: that's just 0.3% of the relevant part of the Innerpeffray collection.

The books containing arsenic in the covers have been placed in protective wrappers and now have warnings about how to handle them. You'd have to lick a lot of books to cause any serious effects, however, small amounts can still make you ill, so good practice means we should take sensible precautions: the books are now in Melinex (an archival acid free polyester film) envelopes and we will now handle these books with nitrile gloves and wash hands afterwards.

Other pigments used in this period may include other toxic metals such as chromium and lead, giving bright yellow, orange and red covers as well as other shades of green, but these metals do not transfer in the same way that arsenic does, and therefore do not require the same precautionary handling.
